Photoshop Now The World's Most Advanced Al Application



As of October 20 2020, Photoshop is now the most advanced Al application for creatives in the world. This is due to he release of their new version of Photoshop that is accessible on desktop and iPad.

This new version introduces five major new artificial intelligence, adding to the already robust Adobe Sensei Al The new features include Neural Filters - "a major breakthrough in Alpowered creativity and the beginning of a complete reimagination of filters and image manipulation inside Photoshop" - Sky Replacement, the new Discover panel, and two new Refine Edge Selections (object aware and refine hair) improvements. The Neural Filters, which is a new workplace inside Photoshop, introduces new "non-destructive" filters to aid you and your creativity. With the Neural Filters. Photoshop has taken existing features and improved them by reducing the complexity and turning it into a oneclick or a couple of sliders using machine learners. "You can try more




creative (and laborintensive) ideas than ever in the time you booked for your project, and you have all the power of Photoshop when you take your Neural Filters result back to the canvas for final touches." With Sky Filters, Photoshop

has made it faster and easier than ever before to create stunning images by swapping in a new sky. Smarter than ever, Photoshop can now tell the difference between the foreground of a photograph and the sky. "Let the new

Sensei-powered, machine-learning models do the masking and blending. You can zoom in and select just a section of sky, or move the sky around to find the right configuration of clouds or colour (or planets) you want.

n 1988, Nikon released the first commercial DSLR camera and the photography world changed forever. Now, as we reach the end of 2020, Kodak wants to transport us back half a century with the release of their 70's inspired metal film case.

This nostalgic tin, that comes in six different colours, allows you to truly immerse yourself into the world of film photography. The metal cannisters are emblazoned with the iconic Kodak brand logo and comes in red, blue, yellow, silver, black, and white.

The cases are described as "an essential piece to every film lover to

segregates them neatly by an inner case." The inspiration for these cannisters comes from Kodak's film packaging from the 1970's. Originally made of aluminium and the cap made of steel. the package was later swapped for grey-top plastic containers. "The cannisters were painted in colours and carried lots of joyful memories. It was indeed a big part of the film photography history," Kodak aims to recreate these tins in a more practical and stylish fashion.











fter being forced to sell his favourite camera due to Covid-19, has decided to keep his spirits up and his creativity alive by building a 4x5 large format camera using LEGO blocks. The photographer, Abe-Chan, who goes by @wagoimages on social media decided to not let his creativity go to waste and pulled out some boxes of LEGO, a lens, bellows, and around alass.

The finishing touches on the camera are two spirit levels held up by LEGO dogs and guarded by a Lego figurine.
"In 2020, due to the influence of the new coronavirus, I gave up all cameras in order to survive the poor management of restaurants, which is his main business."
Using his son's LEGO,
Abe-Chan created "a large format camera that focuses on the expansion and contraction of the bellows.

As he built the camera, he decided he wanted to add a number of functions that he usually lacked, including a tilt function and a swing function. He also wanted to use a telephoto lens.

Abe-Chan says that Tokushima, the city in Japan where he lives. is a beautiful nature surrounded place. "I live in a place that is worth shooting. And I want you to know its beauty" Since the amazing creation, the photographer has been travelling around Japan to test this peculiar invention. Despite the camera being made out of a child's toy, the photos he takes are amazina. "LEGO has infinite

We're all children at heart and probably have some old toy lying around that you couldn't bare to get rid off or maybe you've invested in that £600 Millennium Falcon to build during Lockdown.

Amateur photographer, Mark Phillips, takes his children's toys and creates amazing photographs.

Starting out as a photography theme to keep him occupied during Lockdown, Mark hopes to continue with his toy photography. "I have great fun with it and the kids give me inspiration so it's a win-win."





ark hasn't been doing photography for very long - only starting out six months before the first Lockdown started but quickly learned the basics through photography books and watching Photoshop tutorials on YouTube. In the summer of 2019. Mark decided he wanted to explore further into the world of photography and venture away from takina photos of his children. He took the "plunge" and invested in a Nikon D3500. "I wanted to do it right so vowed never to use auto-mode ever". Instead, Mark purchased a photography book and read it cover-tocover three times before putting his newly learned skills to the test. Before I knew it. I was hooked." Mark believes toy photography has

become a bit of an obsession for him and it was a fun change from photographing his kids. When setting up for a toy photoshoot, Mark says he is "very basic and simple". His regular photoshoot kit is a torch, a tripod, and either his kit lens or a macro lens for Lego shots. Occasionally he will print out a background. When he's got his kit, he's ready to shoot.

"With a tripod, it doesn't matter about shutter speed so I shoot in aperture priority and stop down to about f/11 to get the subject sharp enough to my needs." However, Mark does hope to continue exploring the world of photography and uparadina to a fullframe camera to explore portraiture photography. "I want to try my hand at composite images using my my kids as subjects. I've already done a few lockdown inspired images."



Putting the Pieces Together

ne look at a college's darkroom and photography studio and Paul Hands was smitten. He just knew he had to sign up for a level three course right then. It was love at first sight for Paul.

After losing his job as a

telesales consultant in

2012 and his wife losina

her job shortly after, they had no idea what to do. "We both panicked" Paul said but they soon chose to go back to college to get into the healthcare industry.

"It would have meant doing an access course and the thought of it bored the pants off me." During a visit to North Warwickshire and Hinckley College to discuss their options, Paul opted to take a leap of faith and asked to check out the college's photography department. "We'd both always thought about learning more about photography but planned to wait until retirement." Deciding that then was a great opportunity to enter the



world of photography, Paul signed up for a two year course and then stayed on for an extra two years doing a Higher National Diploma (HND). From his time at college, Paul began his ongoing project by creating a Facebook page called "Hinckley Photographed" - now Hinckley and Burbage Photographed. He then finished his studies with a two year BA Honours at De Montfort University. Fast forward to 2020. Covid-19 hit and Paul lost all of his commissioned work, which included a four-film deal with a local rock music school. "I had enough

work to support me for

a year but it all just fell away." Desperate to find a new way of putting food on the table for his family, Paul took a long, hard look at himself and decided to do whatever he could do to make money with what he had, and what he had was over ten thousand photos from his Hinckley and Burbage Photographed project.

"I discovered a company that operates a photographers scheme, allowing only one per area."

After applying to have his photographs viewed by this company, they opened up their product line to him, which included jigsaws, calendars, and colouring books. From this, he has made almost a dozen 1000-piece ijasaws using his most popular photographs - his first jigsaw creation being a photograph of St Catherine's Church., a Hinckley and Burbage colouring book - a photobook about the Covid-19 lockdown, calendars for both 2020 and 2021, framed prints, and Christmas cards. These items can be purchased from his stall at the Hinckley market or via his website.

"The first lockdown gave me the kick up the backside that I needed and my business rose out of the darkness."

The Comedy Pet Photo Awards - officially partnered with Mars Petcare - called on pet owners and animal lovers during the summer to submit their funniest photos of their furry friends.

Aiming to showcase the

"incredibly positive impact that pets have on our lives", the competition also wants to spread the message of competition's sponsor's Mars Petcare's mission of "Ending Pet Homelessness." The competition and official partner are also raising funds for pet welfare by donating 10% of the sponsorship fee and 10% of all entry fees (£5 for five photos or £10 for 15) to Blue Cross, a national pet charity.

The funds provided to them by this competition will help them with their work rehoming pets and providing veterinary treatments and care. The competition's press release said: "At a time when most of the nation was spending more time with their pets than ever, the competition saw pet lovers across the world capturing funny moments with their much-loved pets."

Created by the founders

of the Comedy Wildlife Photography Awards, Paul Joynson-Hicks and Tom Sullam, the competition is now in it's second year and are asking for people to "keep those funny pics safe" until the 2021 awards that will be open for entries on April 1st. Tom Sullam, co-founder of the competition said: "In all the gloom of 2020 the Comedy Pet Awards managed to raise our spirits more than most thinas."



Overall winner of the competition, Elke Vogelsang said "it's wonderful to be associated with something that makes people happy. This dog definitely is a mood-lifter. Happy to share her funny, gorgeous face with the world." The winning dog named Noodles - a Galgo Espanol mix breed - was rescued by Elke's family from a kill shelter in Spain, making this competition close to Elke's heart.

But not only did Elke save Noodles' life, Noodles and their other dog, Scout, saved Elke's husband's life ten years ago when they alerted her that he was unconscious in the bath, ater revealed to have been a severe brain naemorrhage due to a ruptured aneurysm. 'If it hadn't been for the dogs, I would have found him too late. Thanks to them and the great doctors he survived, but during the stressful months that followed, I found photography as a creative outlet."

Honouring her rescue dogs, Elke plans to reinvest a part of her £3000 prize money back into an organisation for pet rescue.

"Our dogs are not only pets, but also family members, muses, friends,"

Tom Sullam says that "the importance of pets in bur lives - the positive life affirming friendship that they bring without even realising it is often underestimated and taken for granted."
